Hail in Sandstone

Yes, we had hail on the 12th November! And 11.75mm at Black Hill Station.

Dark rumbling clouds were approaching Sandstone at around 3pm. I opened the doors to let the nice cool breeze in and parked the car in the open air so it could get a bit of a "wash".

I stood outside for a while watching the lightening display before heading back inside to settle down with a book. The rain was pouring down but after half an hour or so, I heard loud clashing on the roof which sounded like more than just very heavy rain drops.

Heading outside, I couldn't believe what I was seeing. It was hail! Thinking of dented cars and smashed windows (I have heard some hail horror stories), I rushed inside to grab the car keys, ran through ponds of water, got into the car and quickly drove it under the cover.

Next step was to take the camera out and snap some pictures for the Bush Telegraph.

Hail is actually common in mid-latitudes during early summer. The surface temperature is warm enough to promote the instability associated with strong thunderstorms, and the upper atmosphere is still cool enough to support ice.

Hail forms when updrafts inside a thunderstorm lift raindrops upwards. As the drops move higher, the temperatures drops below zero degrees and causes raindrops to freeze and become hailstones.

The biggest hail stone ever recorded in Australia was 16cm in diameters. A resident managed to collect some of the stones and stored them in the freezer. They were sent to the University of Queensland in Brisbane, where they were measured, scanned and cut open.

The worst hail storm in Australia's history was South of Sydney on the afternoon of Wednesday 14th April 1999. It struck the city's eastern suburbs, including the central business district, later that evening. The storm dropped an estimated 500,000 tonnes

of hailstones in its path.







No Santa Claus in Belgium

Sinterklaas is one of my favorite childhood memories. In fact, as I'm thinking of it now, a lot of memories come flooding back! Going down the stairs in the morning and opening the door to the living room to find a dining table covered with sweets, mandarins and toys! I think mom and dad stayed in bed until we got up to this wonderful surprise (I never kept up with dates as a child so it was always a surprise to me). And then in December, there were the children's shows on TV where Sinterklaas, riding his white steed called either "Mooi weer vandaag" or "Slecht weer vandaag"¹, and Zwarte Piet had all these adventures, the Sinterklaas arts and crafts at school, and lets not forget the Sinterklaas themed sweets like marzipan, biscuits, speculoos, chocolates...

Not only did the children get spoiled at home, schools and other social clubs also organised a Sinterklaas evening where they got a toy, sweets and mandarins.

Sinterklaas is actually called Sint Nikolaas and is the patron saint of children, unwed maidens and sailors. Like Santa Claus, he is an older man with a full white beard, wearing a bishop's tall hat, red cape, a massive ruby ring and a golden hooked staff. He is always accompanied by Zwarte Piet who is black because of soot as he is the one climbing down the chimneys.

Sinterklaas also keeps track of the good and naughty children in his big red book.

So what is the story behind Sinterklaas? Well, it's a bit of a horror story actually... but with a happy ending!

Nikolaas Sinterklaas was born in Myra, Asia Minor, in the 4th Century and became a bishop there. That's it. Little more is known except that he loved children.

Chickens

Chickens, we all know them one way or another... But do we really know them...?

Someone asked if I knew that chickens eat stones? I was aware of the fact but the follow-up question was, what happens with the stones? Do they stay in their crop or come back out, one way or another...? Of which I thought, good question...

So here we go, some interesting facts about chickens!

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- Chickens are living descendants of dinosaurs, more precisely the Tyrannosaurs Rex. They are the closest living relatives!
- Chickens were domesticated about 8,000 years ago. They evolved from the Red Junglefowl. These could fly to escape predators and to roost in high up trees. The domestic chicken today can still fly but only for short distances.



 This is an interesting one... Chickens can dream just like us. They experience Rapid Eye Movement and they have a sleep phase called unihemispheric slow-wave sleep. This means that one half of their brain can be asleep while the other half is still awake! Basically, they can sleep with one eye open. Creepy and awesome at the same time.

- Not only do chickens have colour vision, they can also see ultraviolet light, which means they can see the colours we see when using a black light. Hmmm, a chicken at a crime scene... If only they could talk...
- Which brings us to the next "did you know..." Chickens have over 30 unique vocalisations used for communication in a wide variety of messages to other chickens.
- Chickens can recognise over 100 different faces, even after being separated for an extended period of time so they have long-term memory capabilities. This includes human faces so not just other chickens.
- Chickens use dirt to keep themselves clean. They have an oil gland on their back that is used to spread oil over their feathers, making them waterproof. The oil however goes stale over time so they need to wash the old oil off which is done through a dust bath. The stale oil sticks onto the particles of dirt and get shaken off.
- The colour of the egg shell is determined by the hen's earlobe. Hens with red earlobes lay brown eggs, hens with white earlobes lay white eggs. There are however a few exceptions.
- Chickens are self-aware and can distinguish themselves from others. They learn from one another such as a chick learns from their mother which foods are good to eat. They also demonstrate complex problem-solving skills.
- And now for the ham question, what happens with the stones they eat? The stones go past their crop and into their gizzard where they are used to ground the food into digestible sizes before it enters the stomach. The stones slowly wear out and exit the body through droppings.

Hotel hackers: scam alert for holidaymakers

If you're looking forward to a dream holiday, then watch out for a sophisticated new scam that could risk it turning into a nightmare.

Consumer Protection's WA ScamNet team is warning travellers about unexpected messages from their accommodation providers seeking additional credit card verification, as it could be the work of scammers who have hacked into the hotel's computer system.

This two-pronged scam begins with the scammer targeting a hotel by posing as a genuine customer who needs help with downloading some 'important' information regarding an up-coming stay. They might claim to suffer from allergies to cleaning products and need the hotel to cross-reference the substances used, or they could ask for a map they've created to be printed off for their technology-challenged parents.

Whatever the excuse, the endgame is the same – once the hotel employee downloads the malware-infected documents, the scammer will have full access to their sensitive information, including login credentials, financial details and contact information for their other customers.

That's when the scammer ups the ante by sending a convincing message to the hotel's future guests asking for additional credit card verification as soon as possible via a fake booking link.

With the message originating from within the hotel's own booking system – and it being about a genuine upcoming trip – WA ScamNet is concerned that even the most scam-savvy consumers could be more inclined to hand over their credit card details than they otherwise would.

While this is a very sophisticated scam, consumers can beat the scammers by following WA Scamnet's usual advice to protect against malware and phishing. This includes to avoid clicking on unexpected or unsolicited links, even from trusted businesses. Instead, contact the company directly at an official email address or phone number to confirm the veracity of the message. Do not rely on contact details in an unexpected message.

Be suspicious of messages encouraging you to act quickly and never enter personal or banking details into any website unless you are certain it is genuine and you have checked the URL carefully for indicators of deception.

If you have provided your financial information through a suspicious link or in response to an unexpected message, contact your financial institution immediately and follow their guidance on securing your finances.

Christmas Stargazing!

With Christmas just around the corner, it's a hectic and crazy time. So why not take a breather, head outside and look up at the beauty of a star-filled night sky. Stargazing is awe-inspiring and yet peaceful and calming at the same time. It's bound to refresh your spirits and get you ready to tackle the Christmas preparations with renewed vigour.

This month, stargazers will be treated to a special display from the Geminids Meteor Shower. On a dark night, away from artificial light pollution, you might see up to 120 meteors (or "shooting stars") an hour!

The Geminids meteor shower is generated from asteroid 3200 Phaethon and is one of the most active and best meteor showers to see.

When and where to look: The best time to watch is after midnight until early morning on 13th and 14th December. Look to the northeast and north about 45 degrees above the horizon.

Throughout December the planets are also celebrating Christmas by putting on a 'Parade of Planets'! From our perspective here on Earth, as the planets continue their never-ending path around the Sun, their orbits can sometimes bring the planets together, along with the Moon, to form incredible conjunctions.

On Dec 24th, we have a special Christmas Eve treat. From 8pm, high in the north, the brightest star you can see is not a star at all – it's Jupiter! And to the east of Jupiter, a very bright moon lights up the sky!

To end our cosmic year on a high, early risers on New Year's Eve will be treated to quite a show in the low eastern sky. A bright Venus sits near to the constellation of Scorpio, while Mars and Mercury huddle together just underneath. Look from 4.30am-5.00am, 31st December.






Phone Etiquette

Chocolate Date Bark




Ingredients:

- 10-12 pitted dates, sliced in half
- 2tbsp peanut butter (in drippy consistency)
- 2 tbsp chopped peanuts
- Half a cup of dark chocolate chips
- 1tsp of olive oil
- Flaky sea salt

Method:

- Line a baking tray with parchment paper. Slice the dates vertically.
- Press the halves down onto the sheet, making sure they overlap a little so they stick together.
- Drizzle peanut butter on top and use a spoon to spread it across evenly. Sprinkle some chopped peanuts on top.
- Melt the chocolate chips with olive oil. Use a spoon to spread it over the peanut butter layer until it gets completely coated.
- Sprinkle some sea salt over the chocolate and pop the baking sheet into the freezer for 10-15 minutes or until the chocolate is set.
- Take the tray out of the freezer and chop the bark into 10 pieces and enjoy.

CHRISTMAS - DID YOU KNOW ...

Christmas wasn't always on December 25

While Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus Christ, the actual date of his birth got lost in history. Prior to 1931, Santa was actually depicted as a spooky-looking elf. He wore a bishop's robe and a Norse Huntsman's animal skin. Coca-Cola hired an illustrator called Haddon Sundblom to depict the jolly old man for magazine ads.

Rudolph was a marketing ploy

Rudolph the red-nosed reindeer first appeared in 1939 when Montgomery Ward department store wanted to create a Christmas story for children that the store could distribute as a promotion.

In the first year, 2.4 million copies were distributed and in late 1949 Gene Autry recorded the song "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer".




